







Thank you for your email of 13 November 2017 requesting the following information:

- The number of students who have been declined Ongoing Resource Scheme (ORS) funding between 2012-2017.
  - Can I have this information broken down, by calendar year, please. Can I also have the information broken down into regions.
- Can I also have the information of the number of applications that were granted, also broken down by calendar year and region, please.
- Also, if there are any common reasons as to why requests have been turned down, that would be much appreciated.
- Can I also have how much money the Ministry of Education invested or put into ORS funding, each calendar year, between 2012-2017, please. And if possible, can this be broken down by region.
- Any other information in regards to this request would be much appreciated, too.

Your request has been considered under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act).

Learning support funding is organised into roughly three tiers that reflect the varying needs of children and young people, and of early learning services and schools in supporting them.

The supports include:

Universal or school-wide supports

Schools receive a range of universal learning supports designed to develop their inclusive practice capability and ability to provide positive learning environments. For most children and young people, their needs are fully met within their early learning service or classroom through responsive and flexible teaching, and a positive environment. Examples include the Special Education Grant that all schools receive, and the Positive Behaviour for Learning School-Wide initiative.

Targeted supports

For a proportion of children and young people, or groups of children and young people, targeted learning support is needed to enable them to be present, to participate, learn and

achieve. For example, the provision of braille reading materials for blind students and ESOL funding.

Intensive, individualised learning support

For a small proportion of students, their disability, disadvantage, behaviour or progress needs are complex and require intensive, individualised or specialist interventions and supports. Examples include the Intensive Wraparound Service (IWS), ORS, and Residential and Day Special Schools.

Children and young people who receive ORS support will often have extreme or severe difficulty with learning, speaking, hearing seeing, communicating socially and/or movement.

The sorts of specialist assistance provided could include a speech-language therapist, an occupational therapist, a physiotherapist, a psychologist, an advisor on deaf children or a special education advisor. ORS also provides additional teacher time, teacher aide support, and a small consumables grant. ORS funding is in addition to teacher funding and operational grants paid to schools.

My response to your particular questions is set out below.

## Ongoing Resource Scheme (ORS) applications declined between 2012 and 2017

Students are eligible for ORS funding when they meet one of nine criteria.

Applications for ORS funding are declined when a student does not meet the ORS criteria. Further details about the ORS scheme, and the criteria for eligibility, can be found in the *Ongoing Resourcing Scheme (ORS) Guidelines*. A copy of the Guidelines is attached for your information.

I can advise that 3057 applications for ORS funding were declined between 1 July 2011 and 30 September 2017. Please note that this figure reflects the total number of unsuccessful applications as opposed to individual students. Multiple applications for individual students may be received in a year.

The number of unsuccessful applications, broken down by financial year (1 July to 30 June), is set out in the table below. I am refusing your request for a break down by calendar year under section 18(g) of the Act as we do not hold this data by calendar year.

Similarly, I am unable to provide you with a regional break down of this information. This is because ORS funding attaches to individual students rather than particular schools or regions. I am therefore required to also refuse this part of your request under section 18(g) of the Act as the particular information you have requested is not held by the Ministry.
