Thank you for your email of 9 November 2017 to the Ministry of Education requesting the following information:

- All stand down, suspension, exclusion and expulsion data for secondary school foreign fee-paying students (i.e. international secondary school students) over the past decade.
- I expect this data will include information such as: the number of secondary school
  international students affected by each of these disciplinary actions per year, the
  nationalities of the students involved, the reasons for each of these disciplinary actions
  etc.

Your request has been considered under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act). We apologise your request of 23 September 2017 was not responded to earlier.

In New Zealand schools, international students are given the same education opportunities as non-fee paying students. This means they are able to participate in all areas of school life. Schools are also required to provide pastoral care for international students and to ensure care and support systems are in place while they remain in New Zealand.

There are many reasons why schools might stand-down, suspend, exclude, and expel a student. Trends in stand-downs, suspensions, exclusions and expulsions are not necessarily reflective of trends in student behaviour. They also reflect schools' reactions to student behaviours and what one school may suspend for, another may not.

A stand-down is the removal of a student for a period of up to five days. The school principal makes this decision. A suspension is the formal removal of a student from a school until the school Board of Trustees decides the outcome at a meeting. The Board may decide to lift the suspension (with or without conditions), extend the suspension, or terminate the student's enrolment at the school. If a student's enrolment is terminated, this is known as exclusion if the student is under 16 years of age or as an expulsion if the student is over 16 years of age.

We know that difficult behaviours can hinder learning and disrupt school life. That's why in the past financial year we spent about \$95 million over and above special education grants, on behaviour assistance for about 10,000 children. This includes children receiving help from the Severe Behaviour Service and from specialist teachers in learning and behaviour.

We have a number of programmes and resources to ensure our most vulnerable students stay in school longer and are more engaged in learning. Our Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) programme is now in around 800 schools, including around half of the country's secondary schools. Thousands of young people are reaping the benefits.

I am releasing to you data recording the number of stand-downs, suspensions, exclusion and expulsions for international students studying in New Zealand secondary schools, for the years 2006 – 2016. This data has been attached to this response as **Appendix A**. Please note that values less than 5 have been withheld under section 9(2)(a) of the Act, to protect the privacy of students. We are unable to provide further break-down of this data as it may lead to individual students being identified. Rows containing predominantly supressed values have been removed.
