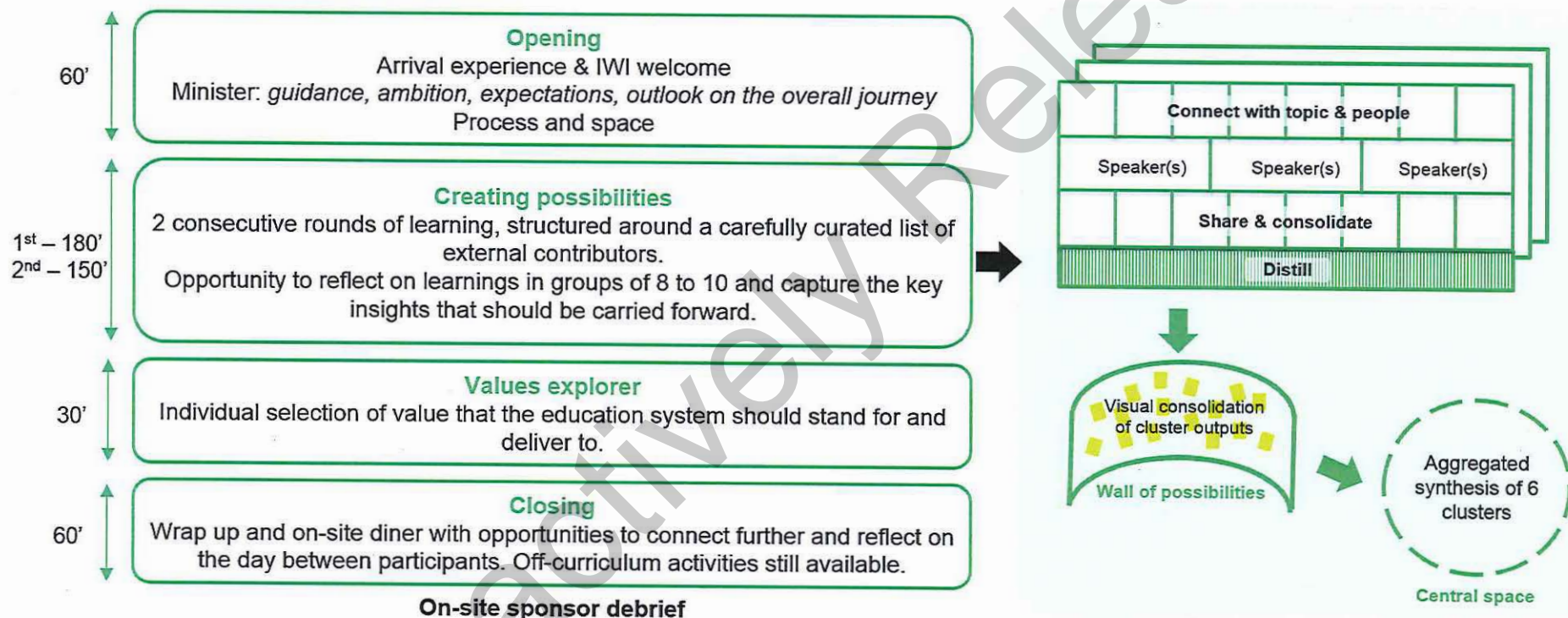

Overview of the 1st day (11-7)

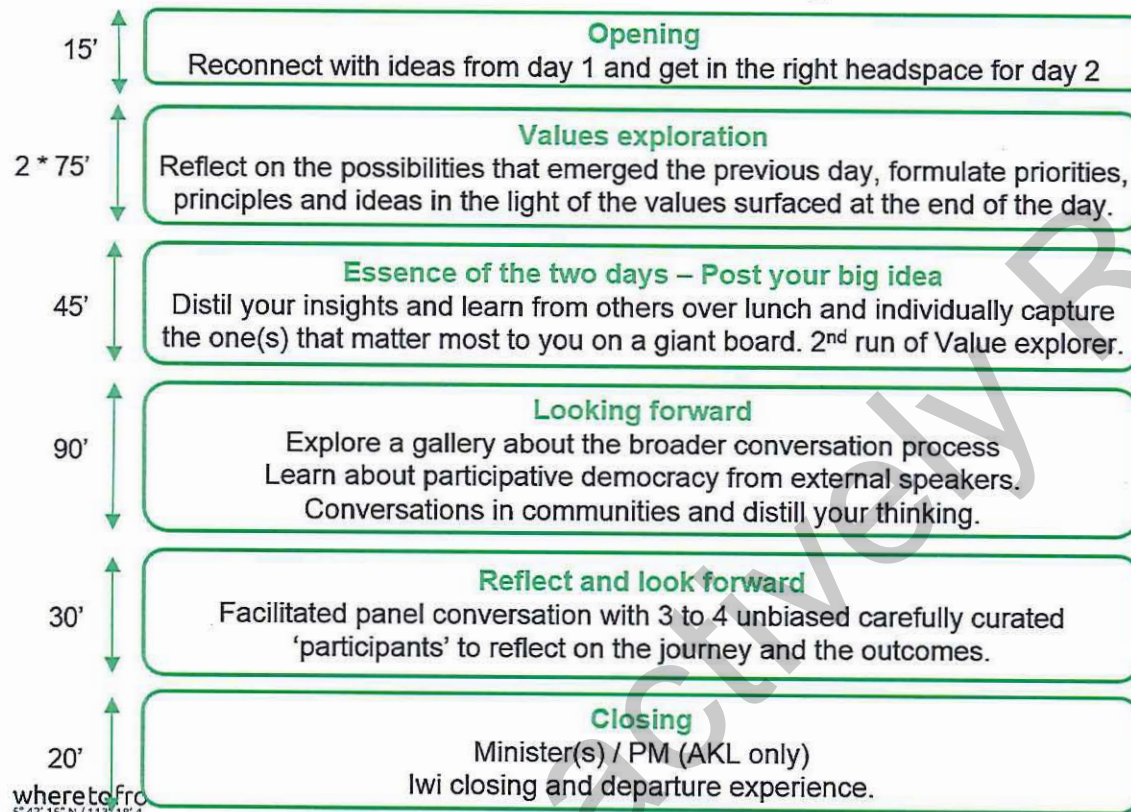

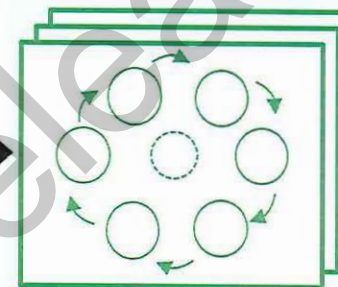

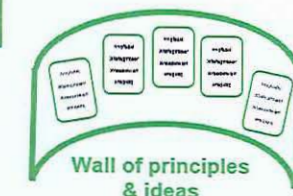

Annex 4: Education Conversation Statistics as at 3 May 2018

- RSVPs received for both Summit events:
 - Christchurch (5-6 May) 727 acceptances from 844 sent
 - Auckland (12-13 May) 616 acceptances from 914 sent.
- We are seeing a significant response to the online survey, with over 6,700 responses so far:
 - 38% of responders are teachers
 - 56% are parents
 - 14% Maori
 - 4% Pasifika
- To attract further participation, we are also uploading translations of the survey in Mandarin Chinese, Korean, and Hindi. This is in addition to Te Reo Maori and 5 Pasifika languages.
- Social media posts have reached more than 425,000 people.
