Purpose

1. As requested, this paper provides information to support your attendance of the 2016 National Secondary Schools Kapa Haka competition, at the Pettigrew Green Arena, 480 Gloucester Street, Taradale, Napier.

Te Haaro o te Kaahu - Nga Kapa Haka Kura Tuarua o Aotearoa

- 2. Te Haaro o te Kaahu Ngā Kapa Haka Kura Tuarua o Aotearoa is being hosted by Ngāti Kahungunu, and has been organised by the mandated Te Matau-a-Maui Māori Teachers Incorporated. The official website for Te Haaro o te Kaahu Ngā Kapa Haka Kura Tuarua o Aotearoa is www.tehaarootekaahu.com
- 3. Te Haaro o te Kaahu begins with a pōwhiri at 9.00am on Monday 25 July, and will end with the handing over of the mauri (to the 2018 Manawatu hosts) on Friday 29 July 2016. On Tuesday 26 Thursday 28 July, 39 teams will compete in three pools (13 each day) divided into three sessions. Each team performs for 30 minutes; the first performance each day will begin at 9.00am, and the last performance will begin at 7.10pm. A programme is attached for your reference.
- 4. The competition will follow a format similar to the Te Matatini process of three pools with the top three in each pool going to a final nine performance on Friday 29 July 2016 commencing at 9.00am. The winners will be announced from 4.30pm.
- 5. It is estimated that there will be over 6,000 people on-site daily, including performing teams and their kaiako/kaiāwhina (600); supporting whanau, friends and local attendees (5,100); judges (45); and volunteers (300).
- 6. Based on our experiences at previous National Secondary School Rapa Haka Competitions, we know that performers, supporters and attendees are highly engaged, passionate, and role models for kapa haka, te reo Māðri, and Māori enucational success.

Ministry of Education Support for the National Secondary Schools Kapa Haka Competition

- 7. The Ministry of Education has provided \$200,000 (excluding GST) to Te Matatini Society Incorporated to support the National Secondary Schools Kapa Haka competitions from June 2013 to December 2016. The Ministry's Hawkes Bay/Tairāwhiti Office has also provided sponsorship and staff support for *Te Haaro o te Kaahu* in 2016. Up to 20 local staff will assist the event organisers to manaaki manuhiri, esteemed guests and judges for the duration of this event, during and beyond office hours. We think this level of presence is appropriate given the status of the event, and the positive profile this will give Ministry staff.
- 8. The Ministry of Education also has a small exhibition space at *Te Haaro o te Kaahu*, alongside a number of other exhibitors. This will be staffed by local office staff, with support from 4 National Office (Parents, Whānau and Communities Group) staff.
- 9. Whilst the space will include information and resources spanning the entire education pipeline (early learning to tertiary), the primary focus will be on 'pushing' young people and their parents/families to the wide range of digital resources available to support their informed decision-making. Available on Surface-Pros (tablets), we have categorised different digital resources according to audience needs. For example:
 - when talking with parents/whānau about how they support their child/ren's learning, we will guide them to the Ministry's Parents Portal (www.parents.education.govt.nz), and show them the breadth of information that is available to support them;
 - when engaging with rangatahi exploring career options and associated subject choice implications, we will guide them to the Careers NZ Jobs Database (www.careers.govt.nz/jobs-database) and the Youth Guarantee Secondary Tertiary Programmes and Vocational Pathways resources (www.youthguarantee.net.nz); and
 - when talking with any attendees that have friends/whānau that have left the
 system without at least NCEA L2, we will encourage their referral of these young
 people through 0800 Count Me In, and their accessing our Count Me In resources
 to support conversations with young people about re-engaging in learning
 (www.education.govt.nz/ministry-of-education/specific-initiatives/count-me-in).
- 10. To further illustrate our relevance in this digital age, we have secured accreditation to capture video footage of young people and parents/whānau attending Te Haaro o te Kaahu. We will ask young people and parents/whānau a range of questions, for example:
 - Why is education important for Māori?
 - What tips would you give other Māori students to help them keep motivated/engaged in learning?
 - How do you support your child's learning?
 - How do you work with your school to support your son's/daughter's learning?
 - What resources have you found that have helped you at school/to support your child's learning?
- 11. This footage, with associated consents, will be edited and made available to use on our Ministry social media platforms and in presentations to enhance messages about learner/user ('demand-side') voices. As detailed in para 6, knowing that performers, supporters and attendees are highly engaged and passionate role models, we expect to capture a number of positive messages for rangatahi and whānau. More importantly, these messages will be in their own 'voices', speaking to other rangatahi and whānau about the importance of educational success.
