Education Report: Update on Partnership Schools | Kura Hourua 2015 application process

Executive summary

Applications for establishing a Partnership School Kura Hourua (Partnership School) opening in 2017 closed on 30 October 2015. Twenty-six compliant applications were received. The Authorisation Board (Board) supported by the Ministry have been considering the applications in detail.

The Board has now selected a list of five applicants that it intends to invite to interviews to gain further insights into their respective application. The applicants are:

- Alliance Health Plus
- Central Pacific Collective and Te Runanga o Toa Rangatira
- Kia Ata Mai Educational Trust
- Te Aratika Trust
- Te Whanau o Waipareira

The interviews are scheduled to be held on the 10 and 11 February 2016.

Following the interview process, and further due diligence, including planned site visits, the Board will compile a ranked list of recommendations for you on those applicants that it recommends you consider for entering into negotiations with a view to agreeing a contract to operate a Partnership School opening in 2017.

Full details of the findings from the complete evaluation process will be provided in March 2016.

Recommendations

We recommend that you:

- a. **note** that the Authorisation Board, supported by the Ministry, has been considering the twenty-six compliant applications to operate a Partnership School opening in 2017.
- b. **note** that the Board has selected a list of five applicants that they intend to interview and that the Ministry is supportive of taking these to interview.

Education Report: Update on Partnership Schools | Kura Hourua 2015 application process

Purpose of Report

- 1. This report provides you with:
 - an update on the Partnership Schools | Kura Hourua (Partnership School) 2015 application process (for schools opening in 2017)
 - summary information on the five applicants that the Authorisation Board (Board) has selected to interview
 - summary information on the twenty one applicants that the Board recommends do not progress to the interview stage.

Background

- 2. Applications for setting up a Partnership School opening in 2017 closed on 31 October 2015. Twenty-six applications were received and all have been accepted for evaluation.
- 3. The table below outlines the areas where applicants indicate they wish to establish a Partnership School:

- 6. Five submitted applications were from organisations that had submitted an application in either the first application round and/or the second application round listed as follows:
 - Davidic Centre
 - Te K\u00f6hao Health Limited
 - Te Runanga o Turanganui a kiwa
 - The Pacific Peoples Advancement Trust
 - Whakawātea Kaporeihana.
- 7. The Board, supported by the Ministry evaluation panel, has now selected a list of applicants that it intends to invite to an interview. The interviews are scheduled for 10 and 11 February 2016.
- 8. Following the interviews, and further due diligence, including planned site visits, the Board will compile its ranked recommendations to you on the applications that it recommends you consider for entering into negotiations with a view to agreeing a contract to operate a Partnership School opening in 2017.

Application evaluation

- 9. The Board, with the support of the Ministry, has been considering the applications in detail. The Board has been undertaking its own analysis against the agreed criteria, and the Ministry has provided it with information and analysis of its views of the relative strengths and weaknesses of each application. The Ministry is also supporting the Board to undertake the evaluation process in accordance with the requirements of whole of government procurement processes.
- 10. The weighted criteria that the Board and the Ministry have used are set out in the following table:

- 11. The financial aspects of the applications have been evaluated separately and provisional findings made available to the Board. Detailed assessment of each applicant's financial proposal will be considered by the Board through and after the interview phase.
- 12. The evaluation process has also taken account of the seven preference factors Cabinet established (Cab Min SOC Min (15) 26/4A refers). These factors will be further considered following the interviews.
- 13. The Board's and the Ministry's view about the applicants that should move through to interview are aligned.
- 14. The interviews will be an important part of the process and will enable the Board to question each of the shortlisted applicants on areas in the applications that require further clarification.
- 15. The applicants selected for interview by the Board in alphabetical order are:
 - a. Alliance Health Plus
 - b. Central Pacific Collective and Te Runanga o Toa Rangatira
 - c. Kia Ata Mai Educational Trust
 - d. Te Aratika Trust
 - e. Te Whanau o Waipareira
- 16. At this stage in the application process, you may wish to advise the Board of any specific areas you may like it to explore with applicants during the interview process.

Applicants not selected for interview

- 17. Note that under section 158B of the Education Act 1989 you have the absolute discretion to refuse to approve a body to be a sponsor of a Partnership School.
- 18. The Board recommends that the applications to operate a Partnership School opening in 2017 from the following applicants do not proceed to interview at this stage. These applicants are:
 - Bay of Plenty Children's Education Charitable Trust
 - Davidic Centre
 - First Community Trust
 - Nga Tamariki Puawai Charter Schools Limited
 - Out and About Life Education Trust (Manurewa)

The seven preference factors are: make effective use of the flexibilities offered by the model, offer effective, innovative options for 0-8 year olds, are large enough to be comfortably (economically) viable, are located in an area or areas where there are students who are not being well served by the education system, bring together education, business and/or community sector partnership(s), have a focus on science, technology, engineering and mathematics and are not from existing private schools seeking to convert to a Partnership School.

- 20. On behalf of the Board, the Ministry is currently setting up interviews with the applicants selected by the Board. These will be held on 10 and 11 February 2016.
- 21. Following the interviews the Board, together with the Ministry evaluation panel, will undertake its final deliberations.
- 22. A report will be submitted to you in early March 2016 (or sooner) providing you with a ranked list of the Board's and Ministry evaluation panel's preferred applicants. Full details of the findings from the evaluation process will be provided in this report.
- 23. Subject to your approval, your proposed decision(s) will be set out in a draft Cabinet paper due with you in March 2016.
