Findings of the Specialist Audit of Te Pūmanawa o te Wairua Partnership School

Purpose

1. The report provides advice on whether there are grounds to terminate the Partnership School Agreement (the Agreement) with Ngā Parirau Mātauranga Trust (the Trust) in relation to the Partnership School Te Pūmanawa o te Wairua (formerly Kura Hourua ki Whangaruru). This advice is based on the specialist audit conducted by Deloitte, supported by the ERO.

Selection of the Sponsor to open a Partnership School

- 2. Although the **Ministry of Education expressed concerns** about its ability to open in the timeframe available, I was **assured by the Authorisation Board** that the Board was confident in the sponsor. (*Paras 6-8*)
- 3. The school **successfully opened on 10 February 2014** with 70 students. Its Guaranteed Minimum Roll was 71. (Para 12)

Developments at the School

- 4. In April 2014, at the scheduled completion of the readiness review, the ERO advised the school was not ready to operate without substantial support. I approved an extension to the readiness review period to allow time for the school to address some of these well-publicised issues. (Para 13)
- 5. The sponsor, in response to ERO's interim feedback, developed its own plan, which sought to address issues noted by ERO and a number of other related challenges faced by the Sponsor. (Para 14)
 - This process was supported by the appointed Governance Facilitator and the Ministry.
- 6. In the first few months the school attracted adverse publicity through the media.
 - At the same time the Ministry became concerned about the school's operation. (Exec Summary Para 5)

- 7. On 2 September 2014 members of the **Authorisation Board visited the school and observed areas of concern.** They provided advice to the Ministry and the Trust. (*Para 21*)
- 8. The ERO's final readiness review report was provided on 17 September 2014. It identified that, while the school had made progress in a number of areas, it was still not able to operate effectively without substantial support. (Para 22)
- Following receipt of the Trusts annual report, it was confirmed that the school had not met the Performance Standards for student attendance and enrolment variance.
 - The Ministry also had concerns that, based on the provisional data on student achievement, the school would not meet the student achievement performance standard. (Exec Summary Para 6) | s 9(2)(h) OIA
- 10.

 I needed firm evidence whether performance standards and minimum requirements were being met
 - If not, I needed evidence as to whether these were capable of remedy or not. (Para 36)

Performance Notice and Specialist Audit

- 11. Based on the apparent failure to meet two performance standards, I issued the Trust with a Performance Notice and Intention to Audit on 20 February 2015. (Para 46)
- 12. The audit concludes that the Sponsor: (Para 48)
 - a. has breached a number of the Agreements minimum requirements;
 - b. has not met a number of performance standards, including the student achievement performance standard;
 - c. has inadequate financial management practices;
 - administration staff lack the skills and capability to run the school in accordance with the Agreement without significant external support and further resources;
 - e. has provided reports to the Ministry that contain information inconsistent with records maintained by the School, in breach of the good faith obligation of Clause 20.1(c)(ii) of the Agreement;
 - f. has completed only one of the required actions from the Performance Notice;
 - g. is technically solvent, however noted cash flow will be strained at times throughout 2015, and there is a risk that liquidity will deteriorate if careful financial management is not in place.
- 13. The Auditor certifies that the breaches and failings noted in the report are ongoing and a result of systemic process shortcomings with the school's governance, operational, and financial management practices.

14. While the school presented a real opportunity to showcase the Partnership School model, it was ultimately the lack of capability in governance and management that failed to realise the vision in practice. (Para 52)

Next Steps (Paras 55 - 67)

- 15. I consider that the breaches are not capable of remedy.
 - Under clauses 21 to 25 of the Agreement, the grounds exist for me to issue the proposed termination notice to the Trust.
 - The Trust has 10 working days to respond with reasons why it thinks I should not issue a final termination notice.
 - If I decide that termination is the appropriate course of action, I will specify
 a school closure date (which must be at least 20 school days after the
 date of the notice.
 - The Ministry already has measures in place to transition students attending the school to other schools

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
