

# **Vote Tertiary Education**

Report in Relation to Non-Departmental Appropriations for the year ended 30 June 2017

Presented to the House of Representatives pursuant to Section 19B of the Public Finance Act 1989.

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# **Background**

Pursuant to Section 19B of the Public Finance Act 1989, the Minister for Tertiary Education, Skills and Employment is required to prepare a report in relation to the provision of certain non-departmental appropriations supplied to the Crown for Vote Tertiary Education. Non-departmental outputs are outputs (goods and services) purchased from a provider other than the Ministry of Education who is administering the appropriation. The provider may be a government agency, a non-governmental organisation or a private sector organisation.

The information must be published in the House by 19 October 2017 and presented to the House as soon as practicable following publication.

In the Estimates of Appropriations 2016/17 for Vote Tertiary Education, performance information from the Tertiary Education Commission for the attached appropriations is required to be reported by the Minister for Tertiary Education, Skills and Employment. This report is appended to the Ministry of Education's Annual Report for the purpose of tabling in the House.

This Report has been prepared in line with the requirements set out in Section 19C of the Public Finance Act 1989. It includes:

- a statement of expenses against budget covering each category of the appropriation
- statement of service performance.

### Multi-Category Expenses and Capital Expenditure

### **Tertiary Tuition and Training**

#### Overarching Purpose Statement

The overarching purpose of this appropriation is to fund tertiary tuition and training that leads to improvements in New Zealanders' skill levels.

#### Scope of Appropriation

#### Community Education

This category is limited to funding for adult and community education and literacy, numeracy and English language provision.

#### Tertiary Education: Student Achievement Component

This category is limited to funding for teaching and learning services for enrolled students in approved courses at tertiary education organisations to achieve recognised tertiary qualifications.

#### Training for Designated Groups

This category is limited to the purchasing and arranging of training linked to the New Zealand Qualifications Framework and the purchase of both on-job and off-job training places, including delivery of fully or partially funded training places and other industry-training related projects.

#### What is intended to be achieved with this Appropriation

This appropriation is intended to contribute to improved lifetime outcomes of New Zealanders through the provision of skills from tertiary education, training, foundation learning programmes and community education.
