

- These improvements provide a strong foundation for further growth in Māori students' participation and achievement.
- Overall participation in Tertiary education continues to rise. However participation for under 25-year-olds remains static.
- There is still much more to be done.
- (a) Ka Hikitia Accelerating Success aims to support Māori students' in achieving and participating at or above the level of the total population.


