Issues

The school has seen significant roll growth in the last ten years going from 691 in 2012 to 872 in 2021. The College currently has capacity for 720 students. To help manage growth, we have amended its enrolment scheme three times. We have also delivered eight short term roll teaching spaces and 9(2)(f)(iv)

Impact of COVID-19

The school applied for and received \$39,841 for six successful applications from the Urgent Response Fund for various uses from targeted individual support students in support engagement in learning, group initiatives to support wellbeing and attendance and an across school programme to address increased social, emotional and behavioural concerns post lock-down.

Education Review Office

The school was last visited by the Education Review Office (ERO) in 2017. ERO found Heretaunga College is a positive environment for students. NCEA Levels 1 and 2 results are showing improvement, including for Māori learners. Trustees' strategic priorities are soundly based on building on improvements to date. Strengthening internal evaluation and inquiry should further improve the ability of school personnel to achieve equity and excellence for all students.

The school is part of the Upper Hutt cluster, which has been allocated 16 learning Support Coordinators.

Creatives in schools

Heretaunga College did not apply for Round 1, 2 or 3 of the Creatives in Schools projects.

Property

- The Board is pro-active in addressing property issues. Overall condition of the school is fair to good.
- The school has gone through a recent period of roll growth. 8 additional classrooms have been delivered by the Ministry 4 new off-site manufactured roll growth classrooms in 2021, and a further 4 delivered in 2022.
- The school is included in the region's priorities for further growth. The current and future growth has, and will, lead to a significant non-teaching space deficit and space for administration.
- There is a leak in the Gymnasium roof during certain weather conditions that is proving troublesome to resolve. The school's project manager is investigating the problem and the findings will inform how we work with the school to resolve the leak.
- A contract for re-roofing, electrical and heating work and a reconfiguration of the library and improvements to the hall has been awarded, with the work due to be completed in November 2023. This project is Ministry led and is funded through a combination of the school's \$400,000 SIP funding, 5YA and Ministry redevelopment funding.
- As of 5 August, the school is confirmed to have placed orders for a total of 10 portable air cleaners for all three distributions under the Ministry's COVID-19 ventilation response. These orders have been dispatched. The school have also received 10 CO2 monitors, 4 from the term 1 and term 2 distributions at the start of the year and 6 from the term 3 distribution.
