### Context

- You are a keynote speaker at the New Zealand Area Schools Association (NZASA) Conference in Rotorua on Wednesday 23 August. You will deliver a 10–15-minute speech followed by Q & A.
- This provides an opportunity to announce the success of the Government's investment to secure 1000 additional qualified teachers for schools and early learning services across Aotearoa and to speak to several current issues that are of interest to the NZASA. These are:
  - · the current direction of education
  - raising the profile of the teaching profession
  - · addressing teacher supply, and
  - incentives to attract experienced and specialist teachers into rural areas.

### Conference details - 23 August 2023, Rotorua

- 3. You are a keynote speaker at 1.15pm on Wednesday 23 August for 30 minutes at the Novotel Rotorua Lakeside. The conference programme is attached as Annex 1. Speaking notes have been provided as Annex 2.
- You will be speaking to an audience of approximately 100 people at the conference, made up of Area School Principals, senior leaders, teaching staff and Board of Trustee members.
- You will be introduced by Louisa Barham, President of the NZASA. Louisa Barham is the current Principal of Raglan Area School.

### 1000 Teachers Announcement

- 6. On 14 September 2022 you announced that the Government was investing in 1000 more teachers through a multi-million-dollar package to boost teacher supply and provide extra support for young people whose learning has been disrupted by COVID-19. The \$24m investment package in teacher supply has exceeded its target of 1,000 new teachers across all parts of the education sector.
- 7. Over 1000 teachers have been recruited as set out in the table below:

Overseas teachers (1 January 2022 – 28 July 2023)	1055 <sup>1</sup>

1 1,055 qualified teachers arrived in New Zealand (ECE, primary and secondary) on work and resident visas between 1 January 2022 and 28 July 2023. We know that this underestimates actual arrivals as it does not include returning New Zealanders, and other qualified teachers arriving on partnership or working holiday visas.

Current reporting from INZ only provides annual data for 2022, and we are in discussions with MBIE to obtain more nuanced data. As the border didn't open fully until 1 July 2022 due to COVID-19, very few of these teachers are expected to have arrived prior to this time. This number also excludes the 295 qualified teachers who arrived under the Teacher Border Exception Programme.

This means we can safely say that since the September package, over 700 qualified teachers have arrived in New Zealand from overseas.

### New Zealand Area Schools Association

- NZASA is a national peak body representing area schools (Years 1-13). It has 50 member/associate member schools, with the majority located in rural areas.
- 10. The NZASA supports opportunities for students to participate in a range of cultural, sporting, leadership, and academic activities at regional and national levels.

### 11. NZASA's stated aims are to:

- advance the cause of Area Schools in particular, and rural education in general
- promote the continuous improvement and development of education for students of all ages
- promote the development of skills, and opportunities for learning and training for both Board of Trustees members and any member of school staff in particular Principals and Senior Managers
- provide a forum for the exchange of ideas, support and advice for member schools and liaison with other educational bodies
- ensure that the collective views and opinions of Area School personnel are canvassed and heard nationally on matters of educational significance, and
- be represented on all appropriate bodies such as Ministry consultative groups.

### Initiatives to support hard-to-staff schools

- 13. There are a range of initiatives in place to support harder to staff schools (schools that have ongoing, high difficulty in recruiting and retaining teachers) that will be relevant to some Area Schools. These are outlined in paragraphs 14-17.
- 14. The Voluntary Bonding Scheme encourages newly graduated teachers to teach in certain areas of need.

- 15. The BeTTER Jobs programme matches beginning and returning teachers with schools and kura identified as needing additional support with staffing. 128 beginning and returning teachers started in our schools this year as part of the BeTTER Jobs programme.
- 16. The Recruitment, Retention, Responsibility National Fund (3RNF) enables schools/kura that have struggled to attract a qualified teacher/kaiako to employ people with subject matter expertise as a LAT from the domestic market. Schools/kura recruiting people holding a LAT may be eligible for up to \$8,250 per primary LAT teacher/kaiako per year, and up to \$8,000 per secondary LAT teacher/kaiako per year.

### Collective Agreements

- 17. There are various allowances in the teacher collective agreements (Isolation Allowance, Priority Teacher Supply Allowance, Staffing Incentive Allowance) and the National Beginning Teacher Grant that will positively impact teaching and learning challenges specific to Area Schools.
- 18. As of 11 August 2023, terms for the settlement of the Area School Teachers' Collective Agreement are being discussed with NZPPTA and NZEI Te Riu Roa. Given the timing, if terms are agreed over the next week, members may either be in the process of voting whether to accept the terms, or the outcome of voting may be known either prior to, or during, the conference. The Ministry will be updating your office on the progress of this in the period leading up to the conference.

19. It is recommended that this Briefing Note is proactively released, with any information needing to be withheld done so in line with the provisions of the Official Information Act 1982.

Over the next three days, I hope we can all find and use some valuable time and space to be able to develop collegial and mutually beneficial relationships focused on improving our own well being so that we are able to return to our kura a little refreshed and inspired.

### **WEDNESDAY 23rd August**

1.15pm KEYNOTE 1 HON. JAN TINETTI MINISTER OF EDUCATION

Jan is a list Member of Parliament based in Tauranga. She was born in Hokitika and grew up rurally on the outskirts of Christchurch. Jan attended Villa Maria College before graduating from Christchurch College of Education with a Diploma in Teaching (Primary) and the University of Canterbury with a Bachelor of Education. In 2016 she graduated from the University of Canterbury with a Master's in Education with First Class Honours.

Jan pursued a career in primary school teaching which saw her working in schools in Invercargill and Greymouth before embarking on a career as a school principal. Over her 20 years as a primary school principal, she led across four schools across Southland and Tauranga.

Jan's last position as principal before entering politics was Merivale School, in one of Tauranga's most financially disadvantaged communities. Throughout her career in education, she has fiercely advocated at a national level for equal educational opportunities. After seeing families struggling in her local community, she has campaigned for them to access everything they need to thrive.

Jan's entry into politics stemmed from her belief that the Government has a role to play in ensuring all New Zealanders have access to the services they need to help them to be the best they can be.

### MERE BERRYMAN NGĂI TÜHOE, NGĂTI AWA, NGĂTI WHARE

Mere Berryman (ONZM, PhD) is a Professor at the University of Waikato, School of Education Mere began working as a researcher in the 90s, after 20 years of teaching in the primary sector. She wanted to understand why, what we were doing with Māori learners in education was perpetuating trajectories of disparity.

Workshop Title: "Understanding Te Ao Māori as foundational for learning" (Master class)

Workshop Description: Historical narratives from our joint past reveal entrenched prejudices that have been in schooling since the start of colonisation. Equitable contexts for learning, where Maori and other minoritised learners feel they can belong, requires engaging with these historical events. Consciousness raising such as this will also help us to better understand the implications of the 2020 Education and training Act and how to enact Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

















### **WORKSHOP 2: ANNA GALLIEN**

Anna Gallien has been with NZSTA for 7 years, and is Regional Advisor Governance, recently doing an 18-month stint in our National Governance Team as the Principal Advisor Governance Practice. Anna currently presides over the Board of a Catholic Primary School. She has spent the last 7 years involved in school governance either as a board member or assisting schools in her NZSTA roles, and in more recent times has taken on an Independent Director role on a National Board.

School leadership at its most effective is a functioning board and principal team and Anna believes if you get the governance right, you can "change the stars" for your learners, leaving the school in the best place for the community and future generations.

Workshop Description: The journey that Raukura - Rotorua Boys' High School has been on since 2020, post winning the 2019 Supreme Prime Minsters Excellence Awards, named 'He Ngāhurutanga Hōu: A New Decade' is one focussed on many kaupapa, but in particular improving educational outcomes for our young men, and moreover, young Māori men of our kura.

## TAMAHAU ROWE ATAI HEKE MĀORI | DEPUTY CHIEF EXECUTIVE MĀORI,

Bio: As Tātai Heke Māori | Deputy Chief Executive Māori (Whanganui, Taranaki Whanui, Ngāti Tuwharetoa, Ngāti Raukawa, Nga Wairiki, Ngāti Apa), Tamahau leads the Council in our vision of being a Te Tiriti-led and values based organisation. A husband, a father, a grandfather, a brother, a son, an uncle and prior to joining the Teaching Council, he has been an Iwi leader, cultural advisor, a lecturer, a teacher and a health worker.

Keynote Title: Me hoki ki tō tuatahitanga, ki te kopa o te mouri Kāinga, kei reira a Rauhuia e tatari māu' 'Rauhuia invites you to return to the sacred place of belonging to the essence of your house (profession), where leadership waits'

Keynote Descriptor: Tamahau presents the journey Matatū Aotearoa has been on as part of being te titiri-led, to develop Te Whare o Matatū Aotearoa, the House of the Teaching Profession, the ongoing changes, the challenges along the way, and how these lead into Rauhuia.







9.30AM - KEYNOTE 3 JAMES CHAPMAN

James Chapman is Professor Emeritus of Educational Psychology at the Massey University College of Humanities and Social Sciences. He received his M.A. with Distinction in Education from Victoria University of Wellington, and his Ph.D. in Educational Psychology from the University of Alberta, Canada, specialising in cognitive-motivational factors associated with learning disabilities. Before working on his PhD, James trained and taught as a secondary school teacher. Following the completion of his PhD, he joined Massey University in 1980. He served

for 8 ½ years as Head of the Department of Learning and Teaching, and 10 years as Pro Vice-Chancellor (Dean) of the College of Education. He has over 150 publications on learning disabilities, literacy learning difficulties, early literacy development, reading intervention, and self-system factors in academic achievement. In 1999 he was co-winner of the International Reading Association's Dina Feitelson Award for Excellence in Research. James was Co-Principal Investigator of a New Zealand Ministry of Education funded longitudinal literacy research project focusing on literacy learning in Year 1 children and professional development for teachers of Year 1 children. Currently he is a Science Advisor for the New Zealand National Science Challenge—Better Start, and Science Advisor for the Foundational Learning Success Project, Child Wellbeing Research Institute, College of Education, University of Canterbury. James recently completed work as a member of the Ministry of Education Common Practice Contributors' Group. He has served on or continues to serve on the Editorial Boards of numerous international journals covering research on aspects of learning in general and literacy learning and teaching in particular

Bio: Bill has worked across a broad range of schools within the secondary teaching sector. between 1992-2016 as a teacher, school guidance counsellor, HOD, and deputy principal. He was a Fellow at the University of Auckland Centre for Educational Leadership (UACEL) 2016-2018, and since then has been a Lead Advisor for Matatū Aotearoa | Teaching Council. Bill's main roles at the Council have been as Practice Lead for Professional Growth Cycles (PGC),

Practice Lead for Initial Teacher Education (ITE), and Professional Practice Evaluator for teacher competence issues.

Workshop Description: The Professional Growth Cycle (PGC) for principals, nga tumuaki and ECE professional leaders has been implemented since Feb 2023 as a high-trust and low-burden replacement for appraisal. The leader PGC offers the opportunity for leaders to pursue professional growth in a collaborative environment whilst simultaneously meeting the requirements for triennial practicing certificate renewal.

This workshop will explore for leaders the flexible options for building an effective leader PGC network, illustrate how rigorous endorsement decisions can be upheld, and provide insights into ways that boards connect to the PGC process.

Board members will experience value in this workshop, as will any teachers with leadership aspirations.













### WORKSHOP 2: SHEREE GARRATT NZSTA REGIONAL ADVISOR - EMPLOYMENT

Workshop Title: "Bullying and Interpersonal Conflict" (Employment session)

Workshop Description: Bullying and particularly interpersonal conflict between staff affects many schools and can lead to some highly challenging situations. There are often reasons behind the conflict occurring so understanding how this situation can arise and how to minimise the potential for conflict to occur, but also learning what steps an employer should take will help ensure they are meeting their good employer obligations.



### **WORKSHOP 3:** HILARY ELLIOT & SERITA DREWERY

Hilary Elliot and Serita Drewery are passionate teachers at Te Kura a Rohe o Whaingaroa / Raglan Area School (RAS). Hilary has been a Leader of Learning supporting Years 0-6 teachers with curriculum delivery and pastoral care. Her current role is Years 0-8 Literacy Coach while also collaborating with secondary

colleagues to create an improved and cohesive pathway for Literacy Years 0-13. Serita Drewery is an experienced mainstream (auraki) teacher. Arriving at Raglan Area School in 2022, she accepted the challenge of teaching in a full immersion (rumaki) class of Years 0-3 tamariki.

Workshop Title: "Integrating Structured Literacy into our Local Curriculum"

Workshop Description: The Structured Literacy journey at Raglan Area School began in 2020, with a chance reading of Emily Handford's article 'At a Loss for Words: How a flawed idea is teaching millions of kids to be poor readers'. This article sparked a complete shift in thinking about literacy at RAS. We applied the dedication of the teachers who looked critically at their own practice in order to become more effective and informed teachers of literacy. Hilary will share the journey of English-Medium teachers, and Serita will share what this looks like in Te Rōpū Aroha ki te Reo, Raglan Area School's rumaki reo. They will also share thoughts for future steps; the desire to create seamless pathways in Literacy across Kura junior, senior, English and Māori Medium settings.

### **12.45PM KEYNOTE 4**

### MOHAMED ALANSARI

Dr Mohamed Alansari is a senior researcher at NZCER, whose research focuses on classroom psychology, and the practices (school-wide and in-class) that impact the social and academic trajectories of student learning. He is currently leading NZCER's national survey of schools project and had previously led major projects focused on enhancing student motivation and engagement. He is experienced in designing exploratory and longitudinal studies in the schooling sector to better understand student journeys over time. Mohamed explores educational 'puzzles of practice' from a psychological perspective, and has both experience and expertise in undertaking research at primary, secondary, and tertiary settings.

**Keynote Title**: What do we know about good teaching practices in area schools?

Workshop Title: Role of PLD in driving improvements to teaching and learning

Workshop Descriptor: NZCER's 3-yearly national surveys of schools have given principals, their representative organisations, and government agencies timely and useful pictures of what is happening and how schools, principals, and teachers are faring, and what parents think. In this session, Mohamed will use data from the national survey project to highlight the importance of PLD in improving teachers' working experiences. This workshop will highlight points of interest for selecting useful PLD for schools.

As President of the New Zealand School Trustees Association (NZSTA) Lorraine represents the site-based governing boards (Boards of Trustees) of 90% of New Zealand's publicly-funded schools. Lorraine has been a school trustee since the inception of New Zealand's system of elected community-based school boards of trustees in 1989. She is a trained primary school teacher. Before taking

on the role of NZSTA President, Lorraine managed a number of education partnership projects for her local iwi, Tūwharetoa. In 2012 Lorraine was made a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit for her services to education. Lorraine is a 'big picture thinker' and is always looking for ways to improve student outcomes, through excellent governance and leadership within New Zealand's schools. Lorraine's passion is education, and striving for 'high expectations' for every student who walks through the school gates, so every child has the opportunity to reach their full potential.

Workshop Description: When two students were successfully rescued from the water while on a trip under the care of an experienced paid provider, Tauraroa Area School was confident that it did not face a legal risk. All the usual, thorough, paperwork had been completed by the school and provider prior to the trip. However, 364 days. after the incident, Worksafe launched a prosecution against the school. How and why did this happen? What was the outcome? What lessons can be learned?

















### 10.30am KEYNOTE 5 MATT BROWN

Matio Brown, is a New Zealand born Samoan author and communicator who works to eradicate domestic violence by supporting those who perpetrate violence, to heal. Mataio, an internationally acclaimed barber and hair artist, is a survivor of family violence and childhood sexual abuse and started his domestic violence advocacy from sharing his story with the men who frequented his busy Christchurch barbershop, My Fathers Barbers, as a way to foster vulnerability, healing, and connection. Matt has cut hair from the All Blacks to

the Wu Tang Clan but his true calling; he believes lies in his work to redefine societies view of masculinity and to help end the cycle of domestic violence affecting whānau all over New Zealand; hosting free men's anti violence support groups from locations like his barbershop, construction sites, prisons and on marae. He has since facilitated multiple programmes inside Christchurch Men's Prison and Te Puna Wai O Tuhinapo, a Christchurch youth justice facility and named a Corrections NZ patron in 2020.

Since 2018, Matt and Sarah have partnered with the Ministry of Social Development as ambassadors for their 'It's not OK Campaign' and are currently funded to develop an app; Inner Boy to promote accessible healing for indigenous

The couple are proud ambassadors for the work of Aviva Families, a family violence service centre in Christchurch and for MATE; a domestic violence research department in Griffith University in Australia. Together the couple cofounded She Is Not Your Rehab and launched the concept in Matt's 2019 TEDx talk. He says the movement is an invitation for men to acknowledge their own childhood trauma and to take responsibility for their healing so that they can transform their pain instead of transmitting it on those around them.

A New Zealand Māori (Ngāpuhi/Te Rarawa) wāhine, Sarah is a writer, celebrant and producer who is passionate about the mandate of 'creating violence free communities' and has worked alongside Matt since his brands began. She co-founded Sister Sister, a digital marketing agency with her sister Ngaroma and works with clients across Aotearoa, NZ to tell stories with creativity and purpose. Sarah is also in her final semester of study and placement to become a registered therapist. The couple released their first book; a NZ #1 Bestseller She Is Not Your Rehab with the goal to encourage intergenerational healing in 2021, raising \$100k and donating more than 10,000 copies of the book to refuges and all NZ prisons, simultaneously launching a successful book club programme inside prison.
