Weston Playcentre Context

1 Weston Playcentre is a semi-rural playcentre, licensed for 25 children including 10 children under 2 years. It provides four morning sessions each week for children aged from birth up to school age.

- Families attend from nearby Oamaru or surrounding farming communities. The sessions are led by a supervision team with playcentre qualifications.
- Weston is a small town situated 5 km inland from Oamaru. While rural, with a predominately agricultural base, it has grown in the last few years with additional subdivisions planned for the area.

Education Review Office

- Weston Playcentre was last visited by the Education Review Office (ERO) in 2017. ERO found that Weston Playcentre was well placed to promote positive learning outcomes for children.
- It was reported that children and adults had a strong sense of belonging to the Playcentre community, children experienced enriched bicultural programmes and practices, and the diverse cultures within the Playcentre were acknowledged and valued. Intentional learning occurred through a varied programme based on the principles and strands of Te Whāriki.
- Next steps recommended for Playcentre supervision and parent, with the support of the Otago Playcentre Association (now part of Playcentre Aotearoa) were:
 - a. review the playcentre philosophy
 - b. strengthen individual and group planning
 - c. further develop their use of effective internal evaluation.
 - d. continue to develop and embed the appraisal system (for Playcentre Aotearoa)

Impact of COVID-19

We are not specifically aware of challenges during COVID-19 for Weston Playcentre. In general, Playcentre Aotearoa was impacted through COVID-19 when persons responsible were unwell, or for some in relation to the vaccination mandate, as there was insufficient cover to ensure a person responsible was available in all areas.

Other known risks or issues

- 8 There are no specific risks identified in relation to visiting Weston Playcentre.
- Judy Hinton is the Service Provider contact for Playcentres across Otago and Southland. She may raise challenges that affect Playcentres across the region more generally, including the issue of ensuring there is a sufficient number of persons responsible across the region, and the viability of services in isolated and remote areas. Playcentres are often the only provision available in some small and isolated areas.

Property

The Playcentre is next door to Weston School and has a Property Occupancy Agreement with the Ministry of Education.
