Westbridge Residential School Context

1. Westbridge staff have been trained in 'Ukeru' (https://www.ukerusystems.com/). The Ukero philosophy of 'comfort versus control' is the day-to-day application of Ukeru. More importantly, it is a system that avoids the use of physical restraint on tamariki. This means that relationships between tamariki and kaimahi are preserved and strengthened in an environment of support and care.

Education Review Office

- The school was last visited by the Education Review Office (ERO) in 2019. The leadership team and ERO agree that for sustained improvement and future learner success, priorities for further development are in:
 - sharing experience and knowledge to promote greater consistency across the school and to contribute to the school culture.
 - reviewing the school's vision for teaching and learning to establish a curriculum that promotes student engagement, independence, and readiness to reintegrate into mainstream schools.
 - strengthening cultural responsiveness to promote identity, language and culture for Māori students and bicultural perspectives of Aotearoa New Zealand for all students.
 - ensuring there are robust plans in place to cater for the anticipated roll increase so that high quality outcomes can be expected for all students.
 - strengthening internal evaluation to determine the effectiveness of decisions made and the impact of programmes, initiatives, and interventions on positive outcomes for students. (ERO will provide an internal evaluation workshop for trustees and senior leaders.)

Kāhui Ako I Communities of Learning

3. The school belongs to Tiriwa Kāhui Ako.

Learning Support

- 4. The school is part of the Tiriwa / Cluster 5 RTLB cluster, which has been allocated 7 Learning Support Coordinators (LSC).
- 5. There are no LSCs based at the school.

Participation in government programmes

School Donations Scheme

6. The school opted-in to the School Donations Scheme for 2022 and has opted-in for 2023. The school received \$925 (incl. GST) in lieu of donations in 2022, and \$1,063.43 (incl GST) in 2023 based on the July roll return.

7. The school is not participating in the programme.

8. The school not participating in the programme.

Creatives in Schools

9. The school did not apply for Round 1 or 2 of the Creatives in Schools projects.

Property

10. Four teaching spaces and four residential cottages for students living on site. The private right of way driveway to the school is in a poor condition. The driveway is not council maintained and is used by 10 parcels of land used as lifestyle blocks. It was built (40years ago) and resurfaced (20 years ago) by MoE. A request for funding for an additional condition assessment is yet to be approved as part of their new 10YPP which will begin development in the next months. Our land acquisitions team have also been in discussions with council as to whether they would potentially take over the road as they are planning a new development across the road from the school.

Some damage from the January floods occurred to one of the residential cottages, and the documents to access the approved funds to repair was sent to the Ministry on 19th July. They have completed some additional drainage work to the same area to help prevent future flooding.

All other previous 10YPP projects have been completed, including the creation of a sensory room. Their SIP funding was spent on an artificial turf and staff bathroom refurbishment.
