



Education Report: Update on Talanoa Ako

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Purpose of Report

This paper updates you on the delivery of our parent programme (Talanoa Ako) and a suite of initiatives that were created from the 2016-2019 evaluation of the programme.

Summary

- We completed delivery of Talanoa Ako in April 2021. While the face to face engagement was disrupted, we engaged 1,250 parents and 531 learners face-to-face, over 122,000 engaged in the radio programme, and 2,500 via the Talanoa Ako app.
- Contracting has begun for the new round of Talanoa Ako delivery across 75 Ako Centres.
 Contracts will be for two financial years 2021/22 and 2022/23. The increase in numbers from 2020/21 is due to more school-led and ethnic specific communities delivering the programme.
- We will host partner Induction and Development workshops for all Talanoa Ako partners -Auckland on 3 August and Wellington on 4 August.
- The first set of resources for the Talanoa Ako Guided Resources are due to be completed in July 2021.
- We are progressing a range of initiatives that respond to the voices gathered during 2016-2019 through both Pacific PowerUP and Talanoa Ako evaluations. Further talanoa with Pacific principals, educators, leaders, and churches have strengthened these findings.

Background

- 1. Budget 19 provided \$9.2 million over 4 financial years to expand and strengthen the Pacific PowerUP programme, now rebranded as Talanoa Ako.
- 2. We continued to partner with Pacific community organisations, churches and schools to deliver the Talanoa Ako programme through to the end of the 2020/21 financial year. In addition, we developed two products to respond to Covid-19 Talanoa on Air 10-week radio programme and the Talanoa Ako Digital App (METIS 1250416 refers).
- There are a range of other initiatives we support based on the voices and insights of Pacific families.

Talanoa Ako Programme

- 4. The face-to-face Talanoa Ako 2020-2021 programme was completed in April 2021. There were:
 - 61 Ako Centres across Aotearoa, with 42 in Auckland. The number reduced from the contracted 65 due to impact of Covid-19 in regional Pacific communities.
 - 20 Ako Centres delivered their programme in full immersion. Languages included Gana Tuvalu, Gagana Samoa, Gagana Tokelau, Lea Faka Tonga, Na Vosa Vakaviti, Te Reo Māori Kuki Airani and Vagahau Niue. 14 Ako Centres were parent only participants, and 6 Ako Centres were with parents and their children participating.
- 5. The impact of Covid-19 meant that many of our partners had to be flexible with the delivery of the programme. Partners delivered the programme in a range of new ways such as online (through Zoom, Skype, YouTube) or multiple sessions in one day. Talanoa Ako reached 1,250 parents and 531 learners in the 2020/21 period. We had higher parent engagement from previous years due to the number of parent focussed Ako Centres.
- 6. In 2021/22 we will expand our school-led communities to more schools in Auckland delivering the programme and piloting the programme in school-led communities in Wellington and Rotorua. We have met with new partners to support them to deliver the Talanoa Ako programme in more ethnic specific communities such as Kiribati and Rotuman. This will see an increase in Ako Centres to 75 from 61 centres in 2020/21 with the majority still in Auckland.

Induction and Development Workshops

- 7. One day induction and development workshops for partners will be held in August 2021 to support programme delivery and build partner capability and capacity:
 - Tuesday 3 August for Auckland and Waikato-based service partners
 - Wednesday 4 August for partners nationally
- 8. Two attendees from each partner will attend the workshop the lead teacher of the parent workshops and the administrator or champion from each partner.

Talanoa Ako on Air

- 9. To date, the Talanoa Ako on Air programme has been viewed 122,346 times, shared over 885 times on Social Media, and had a weekly listenership of over 15,000.
- 10. Due to the successful reach to our Pacific community through the 2020 and 2021 Summer Radio Series, we have now developed a 4-week NCEA series to be aired from 12 July 2021, and another 5-week Summer series to run in January and February 2022.
- 11. These sessions will continue to be delivered by teachers on 8 of Pacific Media Network's Pacific language programmes (Samoa, Tonga, Niue, Cook Island, Fiji, Tokelau, Tuvalu and English).
- 12. Due to our limited access to teachers who are fluent in the languages of Rotuman, Solomon Islands and Kiribati we will provide key educational messages to the hosts on these language programmes. We will continue to work with NZPPA, PPTA Komiti Pasifika and community leaders to identify teachers fluent in these languages.

Talanoa Ako App

- 13. The Talanoa Ako App has been downloaded 2,500 times. The App is currently being updated to include additional information on Early Learning, Learning Support, and Education to Employment pathways.
- 14. A full external evaluation of the last two radio series and Talanoa Ako App is currently underway.

Talanoa Ako Guided Resources

- 15. The Talanoa Ako Guided Resources systematise the key learnings of the Pacific PowerUP to Talanoa Ako evaluations (2016-2019). This includes over 1,800 in-depth talanoa with Pacific parents, families, learners, and communities and aligns to the key findings from the Pacific Education fono series.
- 16. As the resources are aimed at building the capability of schools, principals, and Board of Trustee members they will be in English.
- 17. Pacific communities (through talanoa groups) have also requested access to the resources. Hard copies will be sent to Talanoa Ako centres as well as public access via the Ministry's Te Kete Ipurangi (TKI). Further talanoa will be held with Pacific communities to identify which of these resources should be translated into Pacific languages.
- 18. The Ministry will have a phased release of the resources over 2021 with the first set of resources and video vignettes ready for launch in July-August 2021. A list of the full toolkit of resources is outlined in Annex 1.
- 19. A series of Professional Learning Development (PLD) workshops will be constructed with Pacific experts to support the use of these resources in schools and with Boards of Trustees. In 2022 these Pacific experts will deliver the PLD as a pilot in two emerging Pacific regional areas where an Ako centre is not located (such as Timaru, Dargaville, Wairarapa, Balclutha or Wanganui). This will provide these regions with the education tools and support capability building within their communities. The PLD will also be available to several secondary schools and primary schools in Auckland which have the high Pacific learner populations but are not Talanoa Ako partners.

20. The Ministry would like to hold an event to launch the first Talanoa Ako Guided Resources at a secondary school in Auckland. We can work with your office if you agree to launch the resources.

At the Table TV Series

- 21. We have been working with Umbrella Multimedia to produce the *At the Table* TV series (METIS 1250416 refers). The 6-episode series has 24 Pacific panel members discussing the following topics: Pacific futures focus, Pacific languages/ bi-lingual education, leadership, learners, wellbeing, and community.
- 22. At the Table was filmed in Wellington over two days in March 2021 and is currently in post-production. Early feedback on the content has been very positive.
- 23. We are finalising a communications strategy for where At the Table will be released including Prime TV (in discussion), Oriana TV, Pacific TV (across the Pacific), the Pacific Media Network's Facebook and the Coconet.TV platform. As the episodes highlight current Pacific views and issues, Stuff.co.nz will preview the series and write articles of current Pacific world views and thinking to coincide with the release. At the Table will be released on these platforms over a 6 week period.
- 24. Once we have finalised post-production, we are expecting a proposed launch date around the end of August. We will work with your office on any potential launch date.

Writers in Communities

- 25. We partnered with Read NZ Te Pou Muramura (formerly New Zealand Book Council) to pilot a *Writers in Communities* programme. The programme has the same foundations as their successful 'Writers in Schools' programme which we have previously funded.
- 26. The programme involves writers working with communities over four workshops and is responsive to their community and may develop one story or multiple short stories or poems. The authors involved in this project are Vaughan Rapatahana, David Riley and Moira Wairama.
- 27. The benefits of the programme are communities are exposed to the process of developing a story and book, families are encouraged to be part of the writing process, and communities have the opportunity to share their own stories in their own languages.
- 28. We approached five Pacific (Niue, Cook Island, Tuvalu, Tonga, Fiji) communities to be part of this project. All 5 communities produced a book and they are due to be released next month with each community holding a book launch. We can provide the release dates to your office.
- 29. We will take learnings from this pilot to improve the programme going forward. A further 5 communities will be offered this programme to begin in September 2021.

Reading Together® and Early Reading Together®

30. The Reading Together® programme builds parents' capability to better support their child's reading, by providing them with a range of strategies that complement learning in the classroom.

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- 31. Budget 21 provided funding to expand Reading Together® and Early Reading Together®. The programme will reach 37,000 families over the next four years with \$1.56m dedicated to reaching Pacific communities.
- 32. SAASIA were unable to pilot the Early Reading Together® programme earlier this year but are committed to doing so in the second half of 2021.
- 33. We evaluated the 2020 delivery of the Reading Together® programme and developed a case study on Ekalesia Fa'apotopotoga Kerisiano Samoa (EFKS) delivery throughout 40 of their churches. The case study highlighted how EFKS's cultural knowledge and expertise enabled them to mobilise Pacific families. EFKS reached 512 adult family members that had direct involvement in the education of 1,072 children. 13 this Not
- 34. There will be an opportunity to launch the expanded Reading Together® programme in Pacific communities.

O A'u Lea (This is Me) Programme

- 35. A key learning from the PowerUP to Talanoa Ako evaluations 2016-2019 was that Pacific young men and women (11-17 years old) struggled with resiliency and empathy, issues of identity, mental health, relationships, expectations, being Pacific in NZ and transitioning through and from the secondary school to further education or employment opportunities. There are various programmes available but limited opportunity for Pacific solutions, delivery and inclusion of parents and families.
- The O A'u Lea (This is Me) programme has been co-constructed with a group of a dome community youth workers and teachers led by 3 Sons Limited, a local Wellington with a dome sold with a local with the sold with 36. The O A'u Lea (This is Me) programme has been co-constructed with a group of Pacific a strong well-being element. This programme is delivered during the school holidays.
- 37. In 2020 we piloted 3 programmes in Wellington Central and the Hutt Valley and over 350 young men attended. A 3-day Porirua programme is being planned for first week of the end of Term 3 school holidays in October.
- 38. An evaluation will inform the expansion of the programme to the South Island in 2022 to secondary school age young men and potentially to Auckland for secondary school age young women. It is envisaged each area will deliver similar programmes responsive and adapted to their communities.

Coconet.tv

- 39. We are partnering with Tikilounge Productions to set up a Pacific education space on their Coconet.tv platform. Coconet is a popular Pacific online space that produces and promotes content on Pacific stories, identity, language, and culture.
- 40. That Ministry has contracted Tikilounge Productions to:
 - make changes to their homepage to include a tab for a new Pacific education space
 - produce videos that showcase Pacific knowledge and knowledge holders
 - publish a Pacific education blog space where Pacific role models will write about their lives, their experiences of education, what knowledge is important, what Pacific success is, and their dreams for Pacific in New Zealand, and how we might achieve this.

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41. The Ministry will work to promote this platform as another accessible space for communities to access Pacific education resources, programmes and initiatives.

Sponsorship and Funding

- 42. As a result of our strong Pacific relationships we are often approached to sponsor and support small Pacific community events or initiatives. We support initiatives that are 'as and by' Pacific, bilingual or full immersion support, better education outcomes based, or add to our understanding and knowledge of what is working in Pacific communities.
- 43. The sponsorship and support we provide is an important step in building Pacific community partners' capability. Our recent sponsorship and funding includes:
