Background

- 1. The NEiTA Foundation was formed in 1994 as an education initiative of the Australian Scholarships Group (ASG) a large member owned friendly society helping families plan for the future costs of their children's education. ASG offers a range of education saving funds to help parents, families and whānau to offset the costs of education in private, state and state-integrated schools. The education funds may also pay scholarship benefits to students in tertiary study.
- 2. The ASG National Excellence in Teaching Awards are offered annually and provides public recognition of inspirational early childhood educators, teachers, principals and centre directors. Nominations for the awards are made by parents, students, and school communities.
- 3. Since inception, more than 35,000 teachers have been nominated by the community across both New Zealand and Australia. More than 1,050 teachers have received \$1,000,000 in professional development grants, prizes and endowments.

Selection of recipients for the award

- 4. Each year the ASG NEiTA Foundation requests nominations for the award.
- 5. ASG have announced the names of 15 New Zealand regional teachers and leaders who progressed to the final stage of the Awards. From the 15 regional nominations, six national award recipients have been selected and will be presented with an award at the upcoming ceremony.
- 6. Some short profiles of the 2019 ASG NEiTA recipients have been attached to this document as Annex 1.

ASG

- 8. ASG was established in Australia in 1974 which began to operate in New Zealand in 1990. ASG holds an Australian Financial Services License and has a registered office in Oakleigh, Victoria.
- 9. Across both Australia and New Zealand, ASG has supported more than 530,000 children and provided more than \$2.5 billion in education benefits and scholarship payments since the company was established. The New Zealand operation has enrolled more than 72,000 children since operations began.

Key Risks

10. There is a small risk that the Ministry and Government may come under scrutiny for not making this type of recognition and ceremony available for the New Zealand schooling sector. However, positive messaging around similar schemes that are in place (such as the Prime Ministers' Excellence in Education Awards, and the Advanced Classroom Expertise Teacher allowance) mitigates that risk.

Key Benefits

- 11. In terms of benefits, the ASG NEiTA ceremony presents an opportunity to acknowledge six exceptional teachers and leaders, and to also recognise the important role that teachers play in shaping future generations.
- 12. Association with ASG also provides other benefits to New Zealand schools. While the majority of ASG education and community initiatives for children, parents, teachers and educators operate in Australia, last year they partnered with the Life Education Trust to help roll out a cyberbullying program to New Zealand schools.

Annex 1: Profiles of 2019 ASG NEiTA recipients - New Zealand



Early Childhood

• Aimee MacAskill, Auckland University, NZ (North Island)

Seeing tamariki grow and develop from young infants to confident and competent tamariki excited to head off on their school journey is what fuels my commitment, says Aimee. Aimee recently accepted the position of General Manager of the ECE Centres at the University of Auckland. When asked what a good teacher is, Aimee's response was "A good or great teacher is someone that is truly dedicated to the growth and development of children in all areas. Not just the daily care routines, but someone that actually takes the time to get to know the children, to understand who they are as people, where they come from and where they are going."

Primary

• Lee Tibble, Royal Oak Intermediate, Royal Oak, NZ (North Island)

Lee takes pride in providing a fun and safe learning environment. Some of his students come from backgrounds where people have given up on them; which makes Lee even more determined to show them that they are worth it and that every individual deserves the right to have someone who is willing to NOT give up on them. Inspiring them to ask the 'why' to problems. The availability of free information has completely changed the landscape of what a teacher should look like. Lee believes that the important question to ask his students is "what would YOU like to learn about?". Lee has had great outcomes with his students as they are engaged and passionate about what they are learning.

• Renu Sikka, Henderson Primary School, Henderson, NZ (North Island)

Renu believes that for many students, a passion for education is often ignited by an inspiring teacher. Keeping the Maori principle of 'Ako' in mind, Renu has found that students teach her too. Renu has helped students achieve their goals by helping them take responsibility for their own learning and developing individualized pathways to suit their needs. Renu says "Schools are an integral part of our communities. Students encounter many influential people through their life that affect their learning abilities but parents are statistically proven to have the most impact on learning by assisting their children with their schoolwork."

• Catherine Broman, David Henry School, Tokoroa, NZ (North Island)

Students are Catherine's inspiration. She is constantly thinking of ways to help them make progress. Catherine is always thinking of new ways to engage them in the classroom so that she can deal with their individual needs. Catherine wants her students to know that their contribution is valued and they feel good about themselves. Catherine uses an UK online writing tool called "Night Zookeeper." This programme motivates pupils to write and inspires a love of writing. Huge progress has been made and pupils who once disliked writing, now love it.

Secondary

• Carl MacIntyre, Cornerstone Christian School, Palmerston, NZ (South Island)

Carl has a heart for those who struggle to succeed in a normal classroom environment. Learning needs or social difficulties at home or school make education harder for some students. Carl has designed a dyslexic/Irlen screening system for every student who enters the high school where he teaches, so that he can support the 33% of students whose dyslexic symptoms interfere with their learning. Carl has also managed a Learning Support program unremunerated for the last five years, fueled instead by the satisfaction of making a difference to the vulnerable. Carl helped to create Cornerstone's pastoral care model, which is called Life Lab and based on groups of students having a teacher - termed a coach - who is responsible for their emotional, spiritual, social, physical and learning needs.

• Christopher Waugh, Mount Aspiring College, Wanaka, NZ (South Island)

Christopher has been responsible for the introduction of a totally unique 'student choice' programme in the schools he has worked in. This involves teachers developing a diverse array of learning programmes. At the beginning of the year, teachers present themselves, their programmes and their style to the students, who are then given the power to select their course, and teacher, for the year. Three innovations that most embrace Christopher's philosophy are: "You Choose" student course selection scheme, "Open Classroom", the use of edutronic.net blogging for all students and classes, and the development of "Unlock Achievement" micro-credentials (in the form of digital badges) to support assessment of student achievement both in and outside the classroom. Christopher believes "good teachers work in collaboration with their fellow teachers, and, even more importantly, with the students they teach and their families."
