Purpose of Report

This report sets out a second tranche of potential initiatives that could be submitted for consideration as part of the Government's immediate response to COVID-19 by Cabinet on 11 May, and seeks your decisions on which of these initiatives should be submitted.

Summary

- Initiatives for the Government's immediate COVID-19 response must be submitted by 24 April, for Cabinet consideration on 11 May. The criteria for initiatives to be considered at this meeting are narrow:
 - o the funding sought must be needed as a direct consequence of COVID-19
 - the funding must be needed outside of the normal budget cycle to support the response and/or recovery from COVID-19, and
 - the cost cannot be met from within existing baselines.
- We have already provided you with advice on a range of potential initiatives that could be submitted for consideration on 11 May. This report provides advice on final tranche of potential initiatives, for your decisions on which of these will be submitted for consideration on 11 May.

 a. note that initiatives proposed for the Government's immediate response package for COVID-19 must be submitted by 24 April, for Cabinet's consideration on 11 May

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Background

- 1. As a consequence of measures taken to control the spread of the Corona Virus Disease 2019 (COVID-19), changes have been made to the 2020 Budget process. Budget initiatives related to COVID-19 must be submitted by 24 April to be considered by Cabinet on 11 May [Treasury Circular 2020/02 refers].
- 2. The Treasury has set out the criteria that will be applied to COVID-19-related initiatives submitted for the 11 May Cabinet meeting, and has also provided a template that must be used to submit these. In summary, the criteria are:
 - the funding sought must be needed as a direct consequence of COVID-19
 - the funding must be needed outside of the normal budget cycle to support the response and/or recovery from COVID-19, and
 - the cost cannot be met from within existing baselines.
- 3. Submitted initiative templates must set out, among other things:
 - what the initiative will do
 - how the initiative relates to the COVID-19 Pandemic response and recovery
 - why funding is urgently required for the initiative
 - the consequences of not funding the initiative, and
 - whether there are any other options to fund the initiative.
- 4. The Treasury has advised us that Cabinet is expected to prioritise initiatives that are timely, temporary and targeted in terms of their impact on addressing COVID-19-related needs. We have assessed each initiative accordingly.
- 5. We have already provided you with advice on COVID-19 initiatives that could be included in the 15 May package, including:
 - 3 April: a report on our proposed approach to this package [METIS 1225062 refers]
 - 9 April: a report on a Tranche One of potential initiatives that could be submitted for consideration on 11 May [METIS 1225533 refers]
 - 15 April: a report on options for a Wellbeing Package to respond to COVID-19 [METIS 1225662 refers]
 - **16 April:** a report on a potential vocational education and training boost package for COVID-19 Budget
 - 17 April: a report on the tertiary education system COVID-19 response {METIS 1225852 refers], and
 - **17 April:** a report on further options to ensure income adequacy for students during the COVID-19 outbreak (METIS 1225871).
- 6. This report provides you with a final tranche of potential options that could be submitted on 11 May.

7. This tranche has a particular focus on the Wellbeing Package and the Tertiary Package, and consists of the following initiatives:

This initiative provides funding to implement the Minister of Education's commitment to give tertiary education organisations funding certainty in 2020, regardless of any impact on domestic student numbers resulting from COVID-19. This initiative is fiscally neutral over 2019/20 and 2020/21, but requires an urgent and necessary transfer of funding to avoiding breaching appropriations. It has no impact on payments to tertiary education organisations in 2020, or the funding available for 2021. This initiative is led by the Minister of Education. This initiative provides funding to implement the Minister of Education's commitment to give tertiary education organisations funding certainty in 2020, regardless of any impact on domestic student numbers resulting from COVID-19. This initiative is fiscally neutral over 2019/20 and 2020/21, but requires an urgent and necessary transfer of funding to avoiding breaching appropriations. It has no impact on payments to tertiary education organisations in 2020, or the funding available for 2021. This initiative is led by the Minister of Education. The commitment to guarantee 2020 funding requires the Ministry of Education and Tertiary Education Commission to account for the funding for the six months from 1 July to 31 December 2020 in 2019/20. This necessitates recognising \$1.2 billion of grant funding as an expense earlier, in 2019/20. Without transferring this amount from 2020/21 into 2019/20, Vote Tertiary Education appropriations will be breached by \$1.2 billion in 2019/20. 8. We seek your decision on whether each of these initiatives will be submitted for Cabinet consideration on 11 May, or deferred until a later date.

Tertiary Sector Challenges

- 9. The tertiary education and training system will need to reorient itself to meet the needs people affected by the major disruption of New Zealand's labour market. This includes displaced workers, people retraining in new jobs, and young people who face more difficult prospects entering the labour force. This requires more flexible approaches to education, training and careers advice, and increased funding to meet rising demand.
- 10. We consider the tertiary education priorities for the COVID-19 Budget package should focus on immediate measures to:
 - Gear up the system to meet a significant increase in demand with flexible training options that maintain learners' attachment to the labour market:
 - Accelerating elements of RoVE that strengthen employer voice and ensure responsive delivery of vocational training
 - Funding to meeting growth in demand volumes
 - s 9(2)(f)(iv)
 - b) Keep learners engaged in education and training:
 - Supporting continuity of employment and training for apprentices

- Supporting students disadvantaged by the disruption of face-to-face teaching and the shift to online learning, and
- Further financial support for living costs for students facing a loss of employment earnings.
- 11. We are also developing options to extend fees-free policies to a wider range of learners and programmes in vocational education and training (VET). While expanded fees-free coverage may reduce direct costs and access barriers, we do not see this as the highest priority for the May Covid-19 budget package. Targeting support for particular industries, improving living support for learners while studying, and ensuring flexible training options are available for people seeking work are likely to have greater impact than a more universal approach to fee subsidies. VET demand will rise due to higher unemployment regardless of fee policy settings, and learners enrolling in "full-time" study will have access to student loans to meet fee costs.

Next Steps

- 12. For those initiatives that you have decided to submit for Cabinet to consideration on 11 May, we will submit completed initiative templates to the Treasury by 24 April. We will also provide the required departmental submission letter to the Secretary to the Treasury.
- 13. We continue to seek clarification from the Treasury on the process for considering the remaining initiatives that were developed for Budget 20 that are not cost pressures or COVID-19 related, and/or do not meet the criteria for Cabinet consideration on 11 May.
