Departing members for 2020

- There are three members who are departing due to their age being outside the criteria. They are all from the first cohort of YAG members. They are outlined below:
 - a. Kate Morris: Kate initially started YAG as a Darfield High School student and is now currently in her first year at Victoria University of Wellington. Kate provided a voice for rural students and had a focus on equity and wellbeing.
 - b. Watene Campbell: Watene attended Te Kura Kaupapa Māori o Ngā Mokopuna and is now currently in his first year at Victoria University of Wellington. Watene provided a Māori medium perspective of education and focussed on all Māori students having success in education regardless of their educational pathway.
 - c. Nathan Farr: Nathan joined YAG as a King's High School student and is now studying through Otago University. Nathan was a strong advocate for young people with additional learning support needs through his own experience, while also advocating for other young people with disabilities in education.
- Okirano Tilaia is waiting on confirmation of employment for next year. A letter has been drafted for you to sign should Okirano be successful in gaining part time employment which would mean he could no longer be a member of the YAG.
- Okirano attended Cashmere High School and was the Head Boy last year. During this time Okirano organised a student lead vigil in Christchurch after the March 15 terrorist attack. This received international recognition. Okirano is currently studying at the University of Canterbury. Okirano provided a strong voice for Pacific students, their families and wider communities.
