Thank you for your email to the Ministry of Education dated 26 January 2018, requesting the following information:

- I would like to find out the 20 schools with the most stand-downs in 2017,
- The 20 schools with the most suspensions in 2017,
- The 20 schools with the most exclusions and expulsions in 2017.

Your request has been considered under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act).

Please find the data tables attached as **Appendix A** showing the 20 schools with the most stand-downs, suspensions, exclusions and expulsions.

Schools with less than five expulsions have been excluded from the data tables under section 9(2)(a) of the Act to protect the privacy of individual persons and to avoid identifying students.

#### Definitions of measures used

A stand-down is the removal of a student for a period of up to five days, where the decision is made by the Principal.

A suspension is the formal removal of a student from a state or state integrated school on a temporary basis until the school Board of Trustees (the Board) decides the final outcome at a meeting. The Board can then either:

- lift the suspension (with or without conditions),
- extend the suspension, or
- exclude the student (if under 16) or expel the student (if aged 16 years or over).

Exclusions and expulsions are subsets of suspension where an enrolment is terminated. If the student is aged under 16, the Board may decide to exclude the student from the school, with the requirement that the student enrols elsewhere.

This decision should be arrived at in only the most serious cases. If the student is aged 16 or over, the board may decide to expel him or her from the school, and the student may or may not enrol at another school. Again, this decision should be arrived at only in the most serious cases. Excluded or expelled students may face difficulties in enrolling in other school.

#### Considerations when interpreting the data

Stand-downs and suspensions are not measures of student behaviour so much as they are measures of schools' reactions to behaviours. While one school may opt to suspend a student over a particular incident, another school may not. The number of these incidents should not be used as a proxy measure for total student behaviour.

Stand-downs-suspensions-exclusions-expulsions

You may be interested to know that Ministry helps schools manage behaviour through initiatives such as Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L), special behavioural education support and anti-bullying schemes. As a result, national rates of suspensions, stand-downs, exclusions and expulsions are at their lowest, having nearly halved since records began in 2000.

PB4L gives students, teachers, families and whānau the tools they need to address problem behaviour, improve children's wellbeing and increase educational achievement. Many schools involved with PB4L have reported a dramatic drop in suspensions and an increase in student achievement. By strengthening relationships and creating more positive home and school environments, we aim to remove barriers to engagement and improve students' chances to achieve at school and beyond.

The New Zealand Council for Educational Research evaluated PB4L School-Wide in 408 schools between 2010 and 2013 and reported overall improvements in behaviour, including decreases in stand-downs, suspensions, exclusions and expulsions, and decreases in class disruption. The evaluation also showed an increase in positive behaviours such as being on task and engagement with learning.
